MESSAGE FROM THE Mayor

It is with pleasure that I provide a foreword to the Parkes Shire Council End of Term Report for the 2012-2016 Term of Office.

The Report includes the progression of the Parkes Shire towards the vision articulated within its 10 year Community Plan, being in 2022 Parkes Shire will be:

"A progressive regional centre, embracing a national logistics hub, with vibrant communities, diverse opportunities, learning and healthy lifestyles."

This Report provides a permanent record of the achievements and challenges experienced by Council and the Parkes Shire community, in working together to deliver this vision.

On behalf of Council, I am delighted to provide the community and the incoming Council with an evaluation of how the Parkes Shire has progressed towards the priorities set in 2010 during the development of the Community Strategic Plan.

This term of Council has been one of the most exciting and progressive, delivering many of the priorities set by the communities of Parkes, Peak Hill, Trundle, Tullamore, Bogan Gate, Alectown and Cookamidgera.

I am pleased to report that Parkes Shire Council was deemed Fit for the Future under IPART's local government reform proposals, moving forward as a strong stand alone organisation. Council continues to adopt measures to become a more sustainable organisation in recent years including a successful application to IPART for a Special Rate Variation (SRV) to address financial sustainability and to deliver increased community services and infrastructure in line with community expectations.

Some of the more noteworthy projects delivered throughout the term included a \$12m upgrade of Lake Endeavour Dam to future proof a major water source for the Shire; the Parkes Regional Airport upgrades including a new terminal, named in honour of the late Robert Wilson OAM; and the commitment of Federal Government funding in excess of \$800m towards the development of the Melbourne to Brisbane Inland Rail which will help activate the Parkes National Logistics HUB. Furthermore, construction on the new Sewage Treatment Plant and Water Treatment Plant commenced with a significant local spend forecasted making these two of the largest projects that Parkes Shire Council is likely to undertake in the next 20 years.

During its term, Council also demonstrated its strong advocacy for improved services by seizing many opportunities to campaign for better health facilities. This ultimately led to the delivery of a new hospital for Parkes and a new multi-purpose facility in Peak Hill.

These projects are just a glimpse into the long list of priorities successfully delivered to the Parkes Shire throughout the 2012-2016 Term of Council.

I would like to extend my sincere gratitude to my fellow Councillors for their unwavering dedication to the Parkes Shire. I must make special mention of Cr Belinda McCorkell and Cr Michael Greenwood PSM OAM, for their devoted service to the community during this term of Council, as both have indicated they will not be standing for re-election.

I would also like to thank the Council staff, both indoor and outdoor, for their endless desire to deliver projects for the benefit of the community. Under the guidance of Council's General Manager, Kent Boyd, Council staff continue to make innovative and progressive improvements to our local services and environment for our residents, businesses, ratepayers and visitors to enjoy.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the entire Parkes Shire Community for their efforts in making the Shire a positive and enjoyable place to live and work.

Council will continue to consult with the community to ensure we strive towards Parkes Shire's Vision, and deliver progress and value to our community.

The Integrated Planning provisions outlined in the NSW Local Government Act 1993, stipulate that Council is required to table its End Of Term Report at its last meeting of Council. The report should reflect;

"..the council's progress in implementing the Community Strategic Plan over the previous four years and that this report looks at outcomes, ie what have been the results for the community and council as a result of the activities undertaken.." (Local Government Act NSW 1993, Section 428(2)

In 2010 Council adopted its first Community Strategic Plan under the Integrated Planning and Reporting Framework. This plan was again reviewed prior to the current Councils term of office and in 2013 the revised plan was adopted by Council with the Communities vision and the 8 Future Directions devised to achieve the vision being found to still be valid for the Parkes Shire collectively.

Council has been committed to working with the Community as well as the levels of Government in achieving the desired outcomes of the Community Strategic Plan. This End of Term Report evaluates how well we as a community have gone in striving to attain these goals. Council has identified the nature of the role it has played in this endeavour, whether that be:


- a "Provider" being the primary body working on the strategy or action;
- a "Facilitator", using Councils resources to enable or assist another group or body on the strategy or action; *Or*
- an "Advocate", as an active voice or lobbyist in encouraging other levels of government or industry to action.

The work that was to be undertaken by Council was set out in Council's Delivery Program which Council used to guide its efforts in achieving the goals of the Parkes Shire Community over its term.

The information, data and commentary found in this End of Term Report is Council's effort in articulating to the Community and wider stakeholders where we are up to in working towards our collective vision as a community.

Council will continue improve and refine measures of performance against community goals, as well as to build better relationships and communication with government partners to evaluate outcomes.



Council enthusiastically consulted with and supported NSW Health in the new Parkes Hospita Project as it moved from design phase into construction and eventually completion in November 2015.

Council developed a PSC Health Precinct with stakeholder consultation to examine the potential of health related developments in the area of the new hospital.

Council continued to provide and manage subsidised accommodation for GP registrars within the Shire. The maintenance and improvements of these accommodations are funded and managed by Council.

In January 2016, Mayor Keith met with The Premier of NSW the Hon Mike Baird, Deputy Premier the Hon Troy Grant MP and Minister for Health, the Hon Jillian Skinner MP during their visit to Parkes for the official Parkes Hospital opening. Mayor Keith was grateful for the opportunity to discuss Council's Health priority issues for the Parkes Shrie during the visit.

Council participated in the NSW Rural Doctors Network Bush Bursary Scheme by sponsoring 3 medical students financially and by way of work experience in a variety of local medical services. This scheme aims to expose medical students to the potential of a medical career in rural areas. 

ASSESSING PROGRESS

Over the next ten year period Council will need to show it has actively advocated for the establishment of a university level tertiary education and an enhanced TAFE facility in the Parkes Shire. The standard of infant to high school education will be assessed through NAPLAN results. NAPLAN is the acronym for the National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy.

Whilst education is not customarily viewed as a primary function of Local Government, over the past 4 years it has remained a focus of Parkes Shire Council. Council endeavors to support education, learning and training wherever it may present itself within the Shire. This can be seen through Council's Jack Scoble Educational Scholarship program, the Cadetship and Trainee programs offered annually across a range of council departments and the vast educational activities and workshops facilitated by Parkes Library such as REaDTEMBER.

The Australian Early Development Census (AEDC) provides a national measurement to monitor Australian children's development as they arrive at school.





The review of the Parkes Study Centre Strategic Plan was placed on hold during the term.



Council assisted high school students explore vocational avenues through work experience placements, with 29 students placed in varying roles throughout Council during the past 4 years.

A minimum of 7 public access computers were available at all times throughout the Shire during the term, accompanied by free wifi access. This free service was utilised over 2500 times during the term.

Computer training workshops and information sessions were held for the community on areas such as eBooks, eMags, Facebook, drawing, photography and pasta making at no charge to the participant.

Council's Library Services Team facilitated Family and Local History Workshops both Parkes and township Libraries.

Position Statement

Improvements to Parkes Shire health facilities were identified as a high priority by the community. In an effort to drive enhancements to our health services, Council aims to work with all levels of Government to improve services in health and subsequent positive social effects.

During its term Council has seized many opportunities to campaign for increased health services. Council has dedicated time, effort and funding towards recruiting medical professionals to the Shire through work placement programs and residential support schemes.

The completion of the new Parkes Hospital was a major highlight for the community of Parkes, a project of which Council took great pleasure in supporting and being a part of.

Council has taken on many ventures to increase the safety of the community by way of innovative safe driving campaigns, projects such as the Main Street CCTV coverage and by enforcing public health regulations.

As an organisation that employs a large volume of community residents, Council aims to instill a strong work ethic based on health and safety within its workforce. The Health and Wellness program implemented each year provides education and programs to its staff promoting a healthy, happy and safe lifestyle.

Parkes Neighbourhood Central Services

Parkes Neighbourhood Central provides a vast range of services to the Shire. The graphs displayed depict only a sample of these services and the volume of clients or hours utilised by Shire residents per service in our Local Government Area.

Community Transport services are provided to HACC eligible clients, their carers, and transport disadvantaged so that they can access activities in the community. Transport is made possible by a team of volunteer drivers.


Home Modification and Maintenance Service supports frail aged, people with disabilities and their carers so they may live more independently in the community and remain in their own homes longer.








Home Modification and Maintenance clients



Parkes Palliative Care Volunteer Services (Hours)









Council enthusiastically consulted with and supported NSW Health in the new Parkes Hospital Project as it moved from design phase into construction and eventually completion in November 2015.

Council developed a PSC Health Precinct with stakeholder consultation to examine the potential of health related developments in the area of the new hospital.

The GP Working Party Group incorporating the GP Cup event was supported by Council, helping to raise \$45,486.00, of which have assisted the relocation of 2 new doctors.

Council continued to provide and manage subsidised accommodation for GP registrars within the Shire. The maintenance and improvements of these accommodations are funded and managed by Council.



Council has continued to support the Road Safety Officer position which is co funded by Parkes, Forbes and Lachlan Councils and the Roads and Maritime Services. This position drives road safety throughout the area by way of implementing the Road Safety Strategic Plan. This plan includes initiatives such as the "Free Cuppa for the Driver" campaign which has been awarded the IPWEA NSW's Local Government Excellence in Road Safety Award in both 2014 and 2015. The annual "Mock Crash" demonstration has proven to be a powerful method in displaying to school students the consequences of unsafe driving, with over five hundred students attending in 2015.

Parkes Shire Council strived to enhance the public safety of Parkes Shire through:

- Continuing an alliance with the Mid Lachlan Valley Bush Fire Management and Senior Management teams through its service agreement, attendance at meetings and funding
- Implementation of Council's Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) project which progressed to stage 3 during the term. This project has ensured CCTV coverage along Clarinda Street from Bushman/Clarinda Street intersection along to the Short/Grenfell Street intersection
- Supporting the Parkes Shire Liquor Accord by way of administrative assistance to meetings
- Support of Neighbourhood Central and Parkes Interagency meetings
- Enhanced Special Rate Variation Funding allowed Council to increased ranger patrols throughout the Shire
- The design and installation of the Off Leash Animal Area during 2014
- Ensuring NSW Food Authority obligations are met eg Food Inspection requirements


Each Township Community Strategic Plan has a list of Priority Actions which were set by the community after thorough community engagement sessions.






Township Community Strategic Plan Projects Status




Town Improvement Fund Total Funds vs Actual Spends 2012/13 to 2015/16













In 2015 community consultation was further delivered with a "State of the Shire" campaign consisting of:





The Parkes Shire Council Community Strategic Plan 2022 was reviewed in 2012.

Council's Development Control Plan 2013 was adopted March 2014.

In 2015 the Parkes Shire Heritage Advisory Committee celebrated 15 years of heritage advisory service to the town boasting 67 supported projects to the value of over \$398,000, with \$129,000 of heritage funding granted. This council term alone has supported \$184,234.29 of heritage projects with \$72,719.38 funded by heritage grants.

Projects included:

- Repainting of the Tullamore Hotel and Reinstatement of Bar 2
- Pressed metal ceiling in the Carrington Hotel Peak Hill

Council commenced the use of a pre-lodgement service for development applications, allowing applications to be lodged online and then assessed at Council's weekly initial check meetings before the applicant is required to meet with Council. This revised method is strongly driving the compliance framework.

Average Development Application processing times were achieved during the course of the term:

2012/2013 - 188 applications at an average of 23.92 days

2013/2014 - 177 applications at an average of 26.95 days

2014/2015 - 204 applications at an average of 22.58 days





Council continued its support of Neighbourhood Central, participating in the Elders Advisory Committee, Youth Committee, Parkes Interagency and Parkes Domestic Violence committee.

National Youth Week has facilitated each year by a Partnership of organisations including Parkes/Forbes Community Drug Action Team (CDAT), Sound Magazine, Northparkes Mines and Parkes PCYC. Throughout the term 14 National Youth Week activities have been held including activities such as photography competitions, Pop Up Cinemas and Skate Park Events.

Council entered into a Joint Funding Agreement with Northparkes Mines for the engagement of an Aboriginal Project Officer for a period of three years commencing in July 2013. The aim of the Aboriginal Project Officer role is to close the gap on indigenous disadvantage in line with the Government's indigenous building blocks. The Aboriginal Project Officer has provided quarterly reports to Council with pleasing results. 356 Community Members were referred/supported to access services through this position.

Other major accomplishments of this role include:

- The re-establishment of Peak Hill Aboriginal Working Party
- Opening of Currajong Aboriginal Medical Centre
- 2015 Australia Day Award for Parkes Aboriginal Working Party
- Annual NAIDOC Week celebrations
- The establishment of the Neighbourhood Central Community Hub in Peak Hill

Council addressed the community's aspiration for increased technology facilities by lobbying wherever, whenever possible including lodging submissions to the Federal Government.



Council is represented on the Northparkes Mines Community Consultative Committee.


Council lodged a submission to the NSW Standing Committee into Skills Shortages in NSW examining challenges that are posed by the skills drain that can by caused by mining.







Council has encouraged agricultural forums through attendance at 2013 Farm Business Growers Update and the 2014 National Framers Federation Agricultural Infrastructure & Logistics Conference. In 2015 Council staff attended a CENTROC workshop focusing on optimising the involvement of Local Government within the agricultural industry.

Council facilitated:

- A meeting for growers in 2014 to explore the opportunities of growing and processing mustards locally (Co-host)
- A meeting with local growers, transport companies and Graincorp to form a collaborative approach to improving the transport of grain through harvest times
- Promotion of potential processing and packaging of agricultural products to service markets such as bottling and stock feed

Marketing material has been developed and distributed towards Value Add agricultural companies and Council has worked with a number of investors who are seen as a potential industry fit for the Parkes Shire.

Agricultural Industry Media Channels are monitored through information systems such as Google Alert and Hoot Suite.



Throughout the term Council have placed efforts into lobbying the Federal Government regarding telecommunication improvements for the Parkes Shire. Mayor Keith and Council's Director of Technology and Corporate Services met with Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Communications, Paul Fletcher MP to discuss the challenges local businesses and communities are experiencing regarding fast and reliable internet.

Council welcomed the announcement by John Cobb MP that NBN Co would be connecting businesses and houses in Parkes and Peak Hill as part of the more than 200,000 homes and businesses across the country which has been added to the rollout of Australia's broadband network. Parkes will receive 1800 connections and there will be 400 connections in Peak Hill.

Lobbying for mobile telephone coverage in Tullamore was successful with coverage achieved in 2013.

A submission to the Federal Government Mobile Black Spot Programme was made by Council in 2014 with Council still seeking grant funding to enhance the quality of coverage in the eastern greas of Parkes.





A submission was put forward in 2014 to the NSW Government's Decentralisation Taskforce in relation to the importance of encouraging people to move to regional areas.





Council concentrating many efforts towards expanding the industry, retail and government services within Parkes saw many positive results throughout the term:

- \$500 million announced for the Newell Highway (\$50 million of this towards the construction of a Parkes Heavy Vehicle Bypass)
- Successful State Government application for the rezoning of industrial land
- \$8 million awarded in from Restart NSW Water Security funding
- New Parkes Hospital valued at \$72 million

Council continues to plan for the future of Parkes, especially in the areas of service and industry.

- Commencement of projects such as the new Water Treatment Plant and Sewer Treatment Plants in 2016 will provide not only significant improvements to the services of the Shire, but local procurement from these projects will accrue to 35% of total project spend, injecting revenue and opportunities into the Shire
- Turf 2 Hockey Field project completed in 2016 dedicated 40% of the project total to local procurement

Council calculates that its capital works in 2015/16 financial year totalled \$22.9 million with \$9.2 million spent on local procurement. This calculation includes projects such as the Parkes Regional Airport Redevelopment, Lake Endeavour Dam Upgrade.



























Future Direction 5. Develop Parkes as a National Logistics Hub

COMMUNITY STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL

Parkes Shire is the transport crossroad of the nation. The development and promotion of the Parkes National Logistics Hub is a key project for the future. Both skill development and infrastructure, such as a direct highway access route for heavy vehicle traffic, will support and compliment the Logistics Hub. Access to and from Sydney, as well as the development of freight through the Parkes Regional airport will further strengthen the strategic location of the Shire.

ASSESSING PROGRESS

Parkes Shire Council has a recognised National Logistics Hub supported by a diverse range of transport industry and stakeholders. Parkes Shire will have actively supported efforts to improve road access to Sydney. The Parkes Shire Council will have demonstrated active support and promotion of the Inland Rail Corridor and a transfer of freight volumes from road to rail.

Position Statement

The Parkes region is on the cusp of remarkable opportunities. The Shire is currently experiencing an influx of major infrastructure development (projects such as the \$72.5million new Parkes Hospital and proposed \$50million Newell Highway Heavy Vehicle Bypass), combined with a Gross Regional Product of approximately \$1 billion, Parkes' economic and social landscape continues to mature.

The development of the Inland Rail, will provide a direct freight rail connection from Melbourne to Brisbane via regional New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland with intermodal hubs such as Parkes (NSW) presents incredible opportunity not only for the further development of Parkes, and regional Australia but the whole of Australia. It is for this reason that Parkes continues to lobby for the fast-tracking of this nation building infrastructure.





Over the term Council has met with key Federal and State Government Ministers to discuss the importance of the PNL Hub including: The Hon Warren Truss in his capacity of deputy Prime Minister and Minister Infrastructure, NSW Minister Roads the Hon Duncan Gay MLC.

Affirmative outcomes for the long term project include:

- The State Government announcement of over \$500 million in funding under the Regional Road Freight Corridor Program which included \$50 million for the Newell Highway Heavy Vehicle by-pass (November 2014)
- Federal Government commitment of \$300 million to the Melbourne to Brisbane Inland Rail
- State Government funding \$2 million for initial studies into the Western Ring Road
- Parkes receiving the opportunity to host the NSW Roads Minister launch of the NSW Freight and Ports Strategy at SCT Logistics

The transport hub potential of Parkes Shire has been promoted to various large audiences such as the Heavy Vehicle Breakfast Forums, the Australian Logistic Council and Australasian Rail Association conferences.

Infrastructure gaps within Parkes Shire have been identified by Council, with lobbying occurring for telecommunications, rail and airport upgrades.



Council has met with senior road and rail consultants regarding both the Southern and Western Ring roads and their future development.



Council representatives regularly meet with the Great Australian Trunk Rail (GATR) Group, including joint representations to industry and government, highlighting the advantages of the Inland Rail system. This relationship along with Council's dealings with the National Trunk Rail (NTR) and the Melbourne to Brisbane Inland Rail Alliance (MBIRA) provide great support and promotion of Parkes and its potential to the Inland Rail.

Parkes Shire Council's Mayor and General Manager have spoken at many conferences regarding Inland Rail and its links to the Parkes National Logistics Hub such as;

- Transport and Logistics Symposium, Toowoomba
- AustIntermodel, Sydney
- Rail Freight Alliance 2015 Conference (Intermodal Hubs Keys to Success), Melbourne
- Australian Logistics Council (ALC) Logistics Industry Parliamentary gathering Parliament House, Canberra

In early 2015 representatives from Australian Rail Track Corporation (ARTC), who form part of the Inland Rail Implementation Group held a meeting at Council with Councillors, Roads and Maritime (RMS) representatives and several staff to discuss the Inland Rail project and identify information and data to inform early stages of the project. Also in attendance was the Federal Member for Parkes Mark Coulton MP.





Council's Airport masterplan was adopted in 2013 and since this time it has been used as a tool to initiate meetings with potential investors, apply for grants and set priorities for the development of the airport.

As of May 2016, the Parkes region can boast the benefits of the redeveloped Parkes Airport Terminal. The new Terminal has the ability to house security screening and a two gate access system, has a large public space passengers and is designed with accessibility and technology in mind with new amenities and wireless NBN installed. The upgrade to the Terminal is part of the \$3 million redevelopment of Parkes Regional Airport which is jointly funded by Parkes Shire Council, the Australian Government - Community Development Grants Programme and the New South Wales Government Community Partnership Grant.

Works at the Airport throughout the term also includes a new entry way, new runway lighting, connection of potable water, and increased parking facilities.

Since the installation of the new runway lighting in 2014 the Airport received a successful CASA technical inspection audit, maintaining compliance to date.

Council market the services of the Parkes Regional Airport, striving to increase flight passenger numbers by focusing on destination management campaigns.





Improved access to Sydney remains a priority for Council, being identified in election priorities before the 2016 Federal Election.

Council's lobbying of the State Government for opportunities to improve the access to Sydney continues as does its representation on the Bells Line Expressway Group (BLEG).

Council has worked with Roads and Maritime Services within the Joint Planning Assessment to identify and further rectify deficiencies along the Henry Parkes Way as well as participation in CENTROC road initiatives such as a Strategic Transport Review. This review aims to also identify infrastructure needs on key routes and prioritise key transport links in Western NSW such as the Henry Parkes Way.

Works along the Henry Parkes Way include:

- Major Heavy Patch Program
- Revegetation and replenishment program at Yarrabandi
- Drainage infrastructure upgrades
- Pavement rehabilitation
- Extensive reseal program
- Guardrail safety upgrades
- Westlime and Brolgan Road intersection











Future Direction 6. Enhance Recreation and Culture

COMMUNITY STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL

Parkes Shire has a rich and diverse range of sporting, recreational and cultural activities that help promote community participation. However, facilities need to respond to changing needs. The development of aquatic facilities, walking and cycling tracks and trails and realizing the full cultural and recreational opportunities of the Parkes Shire, will both respond to community need and help the shire reach its full potential. It is recognised that by enhancing recreation and culture, Parkes Shire will attract people to the area to enjoy the benefits of the lifestyle on offer.

ASSESSING PROGRESS

Parkes Shire Council maintains high quality recreation, sporting and cultural facilities. Over the next 10 year period Council will continue its reputation as a high standard sports event facilitator attracting a range of major events as well as ensuring excellent sporting facilities for its residents. Council will continue to show a commitment to supporting and maintain cultural activities and groups in the Shire including quality library services. Parkes Shire Council recognises the increasing needs of its communities with regard to improved access and health lifestyles and its strategies will be commensurate with this increased demand. A particular challenge for Council is the ongoing improvements of its aquatic facilities. The Parkes Shire Council Pools Strategy will guide Council's future investment in this regard. Council will examine sporting participation rates across the Shire, Shire Library statistics as well as its support of cultural pursuits.

Position Statement

Parkes Shire Council has placed great importance on enhancing the Shire's facilities for recreation and culture during the course of council term. Council is well aware of the evolving needs of its community and through community engagement has endeavoured to analyse the priorities of Shire.

The completion of the Parkes Hockey Field Turf 2 was a highlight for both the Hockey community and for Council. This project has been in Council's sights for many years and its completion is enormously rewarding.

The design and construction of the Bushman's Hill Cultural Precinct was a collaborative project highlighting our strong Wiradjuri history.








Important Facilities at your Main Field Rating





For your primary (main competition) field how would you rate following areas?




Parkes Shire Swimming Pool Usage 2012/2013 to 2015/2016














Future Direction 7. Care for the Environment in a Changing Climate

COMMUNITY STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL

Parkes Shire Council also needs to work with others to find alternative energy sources for use by the community and industry. Reduction, reuse and recycling need to become a way of life in Parkes Shire. The work of groups such as Landcare in the management of our natural resources should be encourages, as should innovative and responsive land management practices. Parkes Shire needs to collaborate with its neighbours and the Federal and State Governments to adapt and respond to the availability and use of it precious resource. (The important area of water management is dealt with in Direction 8)

ASSESSING PROGRESS

Council has a clear understanding of its responsibility with regard to its environmental impact. Council will continue towards better measuring and the reduction of its "environmental footprint". Council will further refine and improve its decision making and reporting processes, utilizing the Quadruple Bottom Line Principle and its sustainability initiatives. Council will examine a range of indicators previously utilized in its State of the Environment Reporting mechanisms.

Position Statement

The Local Government Act 1993 requires Councils to submit a State of the Environment Report as to the state of the environment in the Local Government Area in relation to the objectives for the environment established by the Community Strategic Plan.

Parkes Shire Council have opted to address this criteria within the End of Term Report through our review of Future Direction 7 as this directly links to the environmental objectives of the Parkes Shire Council Community Strategic Plan.

Parkes Shire Council is committed to managing our Shire's natural assets effectively and efficiently, placing importance on renewable energy, environmental education, water security and native vegetation protection.

Over the course of the term Council has endeavoured to find alternative energy sources for use by the community and industry, completing major solar installation projects on all Shire pools, greatly reducing the operating cost and environmental footprint of these assets.

Council continues to encourage the reduction, reuse and recycling of all materials, and demonstrated our commitment to reducing landfill and increasing recycling by successfully implementing a three-bin waste collection service in early 2016.

Council continues to actively manage all native vegetation within our Shire, utilising current best practice management techniques to ensure important areas of native vegetation continue to provide habitat for native flora and fauna, greatly increasing biodiversity within our Shire





During 2015 Council's PAC Park Wetlands commenced and is now nearing completion. This project was realised through 3 successful grants totalling \$118,000 and by in-kind Council contributions. This project seeks to restore and rehabilitate riparian and remnant vegetation within Parkes Shire. It also aims to improve biodiversity and native flora and fauna habitat.

Council's Environmental and Sustainability Coordinator works frequently with Central West Lachlan Landcare, collaborating on projects which benefit the Parkes Shire and engage the community. Environmental initiatives such as the Sustainable Schools Network and Schools Eco Day have been run in conjunction with Central West Lachlan Landcare each September for the past 3 years with an encouraging response from the local schools.

Throughout the term Council has made both financial and in-kind contributions to Central West Lachlan Landcare for programs such as the above mentioned Schools Eco Day as well as National Tree Day and vegetation conservation programs. The 2015 National Tree Day marked the start of planting activities for Council's successful 20 Million Trees Programme project along Akuna Road. In 2014 the tree planting successfully took place at Bushman's Hill, with 2013 planting along Renshaw-McGirr Way near the Parkes Cemetery experiencing exceptional results with a 96% survival rate.

Council Design and Environmental work areas continue to work collaboratively, aiming to develop sustainable subdivision concepts including specifications for sustainable/eco-friendly housing, solar lighting and WSUD stormwater management techniques.



Council's dedication to reducing its environmental footprint was displayed during the term with renewable energy installations completed for Peak Hill, Trundle and Tullamore Pools through a funding partnership with Canada Bay Council.

Council's 20 Million Trees project is currently underway. This project aims to vegetate areas within Parkes.

The existing renewable energy installations found at Council's Administration Building, Library and Cultural Centre proved worthwhile with the volume of power generated paying for the installation expenses within 4 years.

Council has implemented a monitoring system for the energy consumption at non solar sites, aiming to identify potential savings.

Both the future new Sewage Treatment Plant and Water Treatment Plant have been identified as sites that will utilise renewable energy once operational.

A Local community Household and Small Business Energy Efficiency Toolkit was created by Council and Local Landcare Services distributed amongst the community.


To promote energy efficiency measures as part of the Sustainable Water and Energy Plan, Council in conjunction with CENTROC facilitated the "Parkes Solar Communities" program in 2012. The project was designed to help residents within a 100km radius of Parkes get access to affordable domestic solar panels by combining their purchasing power and achieving the best bulk price possible. The program came to fruition during late 2012 and early 2013 with many Installations made.



Parkes Shire Council Waste Management Strategy 2015 was adopted by Council in June 2015, with actions. This strategy outlines improvements to the delivery and planning of waste management in the shire including the new 3 bin collection service which was implemented in April 2016.

Significant steps have been taken towards providing modern purpose built waste facilities and increasing kerbside collection services during the term.

Major elements of the construction of the Peak Hill Waste Transfer Station are complete with only minor works remaining before operations can commence.

Improvements to the Parkes Waste and Recycling Facility are under construction with operation expected to commence at both facilities late 2016.

Environmental improvements to the waste landfill depots at Parkes, Bogan Gate, Trundle and Tullamore have been completed.

Council continues its active involvement with NetWaste, attending forums and Steering Committee Meetings and participating in its Regional Initiatives.





During the term Council conducted an average of 100 private property weed inspections and 80 inspections on Crown and/or Council land. 2014/15 saw 100% of shire roads inspected for weeds for the first time.

All noxious outbreaks identified are recorded in PSC's Weed Mapper program

Weeds Officers work with private landholders to outline control techniques for infestations based on property inspections and current best practice management techniques.

Promotion and education regarding weed control was provided at the Parkes and Township Shows during the term. Council exhibits displayed samples of weeds and reading material for any interested residents. Council's Weed Officers are always on duty at the exhibit, ready to answer any queries.

Standard drawings and procedures developed based upon information in the Department of Housing Management of Stormwater Guidelines (The Blue Book) and Department of Environment and Heritage Soil and Water Management for Construction guideline series.

Council has incorporated Stormwater Capital Works Plans and Standard Water quality Management Systems into the PSC Long Term Financial Plan.

Since the Special Rate Variation took effect, Ranger activities have been increased to enhanced Council's capabilities to investigate complaints and carry out necessary enforcement actions. Since October 2014 Council has measured over 271 patrol trips outside Parkes totalling over 29,844 kilometres.



















Future Direction 8. Maintain and Improve the Shire's Assets and Infrastructure

COMMUNITY STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL

The Local Government Act requires Council to bear in mind that it is the custodian and trustee of public assets and to effectively account for and manage the assets for which it is responsible. With over \$470,000 of public assets listed, Council considers the collection of asset information, valuing and the development of asset management plans, a high priority and core responsibility. As a consequence of ageing assets and diminishing resources, asset management, in particular asset maintenance and renewal, represents the single biggest financial challenge facing Council. A primary consideration in the development of new assets will accordingly be the whole of life maintenance and renewal affordability.

ASSESSING PROGRESS

Asset management plans will be the Communities' performance assessment guide and Council's management guide to ensure the longevity of the Shire's assets. Therefore, Council's demonstration of efficient asset management will be the development and promulgation of Asset Management Plans for all classes of assets, which clearly define the level of service that can be provided by asset groups, with the funding available and the articulation of those plans to the community.

Position Statement

Parkes Shire Council has been proactively working towards future proofing the Shire through many asset and infrastructure additions and enhancements.

Water security for the Shire will be ensured through a combination of projects such as the Lake Endeavour Dam Upgrade, Bore 8 Reburbishment and Lachlan River Intake Upgrade, the Recycled Water Ring Main, a new Water Treatment Plant as well as a new Sewage Treatment Plant. These projects hold great sustainability and business efffiency features and will allow for sustainable economic growth of the Shire, supporting current and future expansion both residential, industrial/commercial.

Projects such as the Parkes Regional Airport Redevelopment are strong facilitators to boast the Shire's economy, making it easy for people to visit and conduct business.

Parkes Airport Redevelopment

The redevelopment of the Parkes Regional Airport was opened by Michael McCormack MP, Member for Rivering on June 16, 2016.

Over the past three years, Council has undertaken a \$3 million redevelopment of the Parkes Regional Airport precinct which has included:

- New runway lighting
- Installation of new runway lighting including Precision Approach Path Indicator (PAPI) and Runway Threshold Lighting (RTIL)
- Upgraded new Airport Terminal including security readiness
- NBN installation at the terminal
- Connection of potable water
- Additional car parking
- Upgrades to the Parkes Aero Club
- New entry treatment and widening of entry road

The new terminal, built 2015/16, has delivered a facility that includes infrastructure to future proof the facility including terminal refurbishment and expansion, infrastructure and technology improvements, accessible design, improved baggage handling and new security regime readiness.

The contract was awarded to Hines Constructions who used 27% (\$465,185 value) local and nearby suppliers to deliver the project.



This significant project strengthened the 1940s dam to ensure the long term stability and integrity of Lake Endeavour, a key water reservoir for the Shire, as well as providing increased flood security.

Lake Endeavour Dam had performed satisfactorily for 76 years, however in studies carried out by the NSW Dams Safety Committee, the spillway capacity was considered inadequate by modern standards and required strengthening and flood security works.

The contract was let to Entracon Civil in 2014 and the project was administered by Parkes Shire Council. Design technical advice during construction was provided by the dam designer, NSW Public Works.

The upgrade works involved strengthening and raising of the existing earthen embankment and spillway training wall, construction of a new auxiliary fuse plug spillway and raising the current embankment crest.

Total expenditure for the project was \$12.2 million, with \$3.4 million local procurement.

Lake Endeavour Dam

Parkes Shire Council worked with Parkes Hockey Inc to construct a second synthetic international standard hockey pitch to enable the sport to continue to grow and host competitions. The pitch was completed on 10 June 2016.

Parkes Hockey Inc have been advocating and fundraising for a second synthetic hockey pitch for over 10 years. Due to the popularity of the sport (400+ members) players were restricted to playing and training times on synthetic surface.

A Development Application was approved in December 2010 for the construction of the pitch, however it wasn't until November 2014 that the final funding partner was secured (Clubgrants Category 3) and the project could finally go ahead.

This facility has given Parkes Hockey Inc the opportunity to bid for significant regional and state competitions and events which bring huge economic benefit to Parkes and the surrounding region.

Total project expenditure was \$1.3 million with \$528,448 spent in local procurement, this equates to approximately 40% of the total project.



New Water Treatment Plant

The new Water Treatment Plant will produce a robust water supply with a minimal power requirement due to the utilisation of gravity filters and usage of PV panels, have a 'zero discharge', be a fully automated plant requiring minimal operator supervision and utilise the latest technologies for water production and water quality monitoring.



New Sewage Treatment Plant

The Parkes Sewage Treatment Plant upgrade is a new 15,000 EP (equivalent people) treatment plant to be constructed on a green-field site.

The new plant is based on an aerobic biological process which can be driven to produce a high quality effluent, suitable for a range of reuse applications and environmental discharge.



Lachlan River Pump Station

The proposed River Intake Pump Upgrade and Bore 8 Refurbishment are associated with the new water treatment plant and are designed to have positive long term socioeconomic benefits for the community by providing high quality and secure water sources.



Peak Hill Waste Transfer Station

The construction of the new Waste Transfer Station at Peak Hill is to provide enhanced services to customers, including undercover waste dropoff areas, new sealed roads, staff amenities and signage.





Parkes Shire Council's water infrastructure saw considerable upgrades throughout the term with the Lake Endeavour Dam Upgrade project completed in December 2015. This project included dam wall strengthening as well as an Early Warning Detection System which has proved greatly to be valuable since implementation.

A successful grant application under the Restart NSW Water Security Grant for \$2.6 million has allowed for the upgrade of the Lachlan River Intake and the refurbishment of Bore 8. This project is nearing completion and once operational will meet Council's Secure Yield Strategy for a further 30 years.

The Recycled Water Ring Main Project will create a new local water source, reducing the need to pump from the borefield in Forbes and the pressure on limited natural water sources. It is expected this new water source will meet 87% of the future demand on non potable water in the Shire. As at the end of 2015/16 this project is at final planning stage.


After a selective tender process, the tender for the new Water Treatment Plant was awarded to John Holland Pty Ltd in October 2015.

Pump Stations on Eugowra Road, Back Yamma Road and High Street were all retrofitted with high efficiency pumps and VFD's as well as power factor correction, funded under the Community Energy Efficiency Grant in 2014.





The Parkes Shire Council New Sewage Treatment Plant Project progressed from planning phase to construction phase during the council term. The Expression of Interest for the Treatment Plant was formally called on the 18 May 2015 and closed on the 19 June 2015. The selective tender process was completed in October 2015 - awarded to John Holland Pty Ltd.

\$8.5 million of funding was secured through the National Stronger Regions fund to construct a new water recycling facility at the new Sewage Treatment Plant.

Throughout the term treated effluent was provided to Peak Hill and Parkes Golf Courses.

Only 1 environmental license breach was recorded throughout the entire term.






