1. Introduction

This report places on record the sports-based achievements and activities of the Parkes Sports Council and the Parkes Shire Council during the past 12 months to 30 June 2023.

As a Section 355 Committee of Parkes Shire Council, the Parkes Sports Council takes considerable pride in its responsibility for the use of facilities by the sporting public of Parkes Shire. These facilities are used by over 7,000 sporting group members and school children.

The investment in sport infrastructure returns dividends to the community, through sports tourism and the injection of funds that these events return to local business.

1.1. Parkes Shire Council's Support of Sport

The Sports Council members appreciated the interest and contribution provided by the Mayor and life member of the Sports Council Cr Ken Keith (OAM), as well as Councillor Louise O'Leary.

The efforts of Council's Open Spaces Supervisor, Geoff Finn and the Sports Field team of Matt Gillogly, Justin Terrill and Corey Hedges were often congratulated by sporting groups and visitors on the presentation of the sporting fields. In addition, the building maintenance services of Bart Ingram was essential, and he is to be congratulated for his professionalism and attention to task over the past year. In particular, the efforts of Tim Gillogly and his management of several sports projects was exemplary, as was the relationships he cultivated with his stakeholders.

1.2. Investment in Sport

Luke Nash again provided professional and adept reporting on the sports activities undertaken by the Council during the year.

The income and expenditure report on the sporting activities of Parkes Shire Council has been prepared and is presented and included as <u>Appendix A</u>. The report indicates to the sporting groups where their fees and levies are spent and shows the contribution Parkes Shire Council makes to sport, which was \$305k.

Major costs continue to be salaries and wages, electricity, materials, turf maintenance and repairs. Also included is a report on the capital projects and their status as of 30 June 2023. In total, Parkes Shire Council delivered or is delivering over \$10m in sports-based infrastructure during the past twelve months.

2. Activities of the Sports Council

2.1. Duncan Macdonald Foundation

Parkes Shire Council performed a custodial role for the monies held on behalf of the Duncan McDonald Foundation and is honoured to administer this foundation as it continues its good works in supporting and developing Cricket in Parkes.

The Foundation Committee, including Greg Morrissey, Greg Duffy, Michael Greenwood, and Peter Yelland, in their fiduciary roll allocated funds of \$500 to Ewan Moody and Harry Yelland to attend the cricket youth carnival in Dubbo during December 2022.

The current balance of the Duncan McDonald Trust at the end of the fiscal year was \$11,920.14.



2.2. Ron Harrison Memorial Sports Bursary

The Parkes Shire Council originally received funding of \$10,000 from Parkes Rotary to underwrite the Ron Harrison Memorial Sports Bursaries into the future. The funds from this donation have now been fully exhausted.

The purpose of the bursary is to:

- 1. Perpetuate the memory of the late Ron Harrison OAM who passed away in 1985 for his contribution to the community of Parkes and district, particularly in the development of sport.
- 2. Provide financial assistance to sportspersons of the Parkes Shire, particularly those at junior level, who demonstrate the need for such assistance to develop their career.

2.3. Northparkes Mine / Parkes Shire Sports Grants Scheme

CMOC Northparkes Mine, Parkes Shire Council and the Parkes Sports Council have developed a program to provide donations to sporting bodies under a jointly developed grants policy. This Sports Grant program aims to increase regular and on-going participation opportunities in sport, and to improve the sporting infrastructure within the Parkes Shire. The grant program is managed by the Parkes Sports Council.

A new improved program started from January 2018 and was renewed in 2021. This program has been enhanced to include additional funding from Parkes Shire Council to boost the total funds available to \$180,000 over three years.

- One (1) community representative (Michael Greenwood)

Sports Grants Provided

During the past fiscal year, there were 35 applications for sports grants in the two rounds of funding offers.



6. Sport and Recreation - Major Projects Delivered

6.1. Spicer Oval Grandstand, Clubroom, Amenities and Carpark

The Spicer Oval Grandstand, Clubroom, Amenities and carpark project was completed during past financial year, with the official opening held on Saturday 29 July 2023. This new fit-for-purpose facility was built with function in mind. Standing at 48m x 15m in size, it hosts four changerooms, a function room and kitchen as well as room for 300 seats under cover to watch matches of both rugby and cricket. The facility is supported by a new carpark as well as new lighting, most of which has been grant funded.

The project received \$900,000 from the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program as well as \$1,628,081 from the NSW Government's Resources for Regions program Round 7. Parkes Boars contributed \$27,000 and local sporting grants were secured for \$8000, with the project totalling \$2,677,000.

This facility gives Parkes Rugby a home ground facility for the first time in 12 years. Rugby has had no amenities building, no clubhouse and no lights to train under for more than a decade and thanks to several grants, they now have these facilities to support current and future users. The four changerooms also enables the club to adequately support female rugby players, a growing sport across the globe.

6.2. Hockey Turf 1 - Stephen Davies Field Upgrade

The original hockey field on the site was a sand filled surface constructed in 1992 and named after Parkes born, three times Hockey Olympian, Stephen Davies. The original surface was replaced with a non-filled synthetic surface in 2012, which was in reasonable condition, however the pavement below had failed in several locations.

The field is serviced by an existing Metal Halide 8 pole sports field lighting system which will be refurbished using an LED system. The sports field lighting works will be undertaken by a separate contractor during the undertaking of the hockey field design and construction works.

The new facility will become the premier Hockey facility in Parkes.

This project has been funded under the NSW Government's Resources for Regions program and Stronger Country Communities fund along with a co-contribution from Parkes Shire Council and Parkes Hockey Incorporated.

6.3. Parkes Skate Park and Pump Track

Parkes Shire Council delivered new infrastructure at the Parkes Skate Park area in Keast Park, including an extension to the existing skate park and a new pump track, which was funded by the NSW Government. Further works to the site will continue with more funding provided by the Federal Government under the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

The Skate Park Extension project saw the design of new elements, including:

- Two new concrete skate bowls.
- A ramp connecting the facilities.
- Additional shade.
- Additional bin area.
- Perimeter lighting and landscaping.

The project was funded by the Stronger Country Communities Fund Round 3 for \$150,000. The objective of this round of funding was to support youth-focused projects within the community.

The second part of this project is the new Pump Track and CCTV. The track adds another dimension to the skate park and allows scooter and bike riders to engage with a challenging track. The pump track and CCTV was fully funded under the Stronger Country Communities Fund Round 4 for \$200,000.

6.4. Berryman Oval - Skate Park and Exercise Equipment

The Trundle Skate Park Project funded by the NSW Government's Stronger Country Communities Fund for \$150,000, the Trundle Progress Association for \$20,000 and Trundle Town Improvement Vote from Parkes Shire Council for \$8,000 and Parkes Shire Council for \$10,000



The skate park consists of several elements designed after consultation with school-aged children in the local schools. The Trundle Community Consultative Committee undertook further consultation at the Trundle Show, where community youth members suggested their priority projects for their township. The skate park was the number one project.

Covid lockdowns, ongoing wet weather, and natural disasters prolonged the project delivery.

The skate park also offers the youth of the town another opportunity to engage with a new active lifestyle option, a social outlet and a chance to learn new skills.

Now installed in the Berryman Oval precinct, the skate park adds to the delivery of all the grantfunded projects Parkes Shire Council has secured and has installed recently, including:

- Exercise equipment (also funded by the Stronger Country Communities Fund)
- Cricket nets (funded by the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program).

6.5. Peak Hill Tennis Courts Improvements

During the year a contractor was engaged by Parkes Shire Council to clean the Peak Hill Tennis courts. They had become damaged and mouldy following the long period of wet weather. In addition, water from the surrounding gardens had seeped onto the courts and a block retaining wall was damaged. This wall was also repaired.

6.6. Trundle Pool Upgrade

Parkes Shire Council was successful in obtaining funds under the Crown Lands Improvement Fund under the 2019/20 round for \$384,753 with a Council co-fund of \$76,183 to provide new fibreglass skin, repairs to concrete concourse, tilling, painting and some other remediation works. 7. Sport and Recreation - Major Projects in Delivery

7.1. Parkes Aquatic Centre – Amenities upgrade


Parkes Aquatic Centre is set to receive a complete overhaul of the female amenities thanks to the NSW Government's Female Friendly Community Sport Facilities Program.

The \$497,705 project will result in substantial upgrades to the toilet and shower facilities and introduce 10 private changerooms and a roof overhead to provide a safe and secure space for females of all ages and abilities at the pool.

Upgrades to the facilities will include new shower and toilet cubicles, hot water services, upgraded change cubicles, a new insulated roof, additional seating and refreshed paint and tiles throughout.

The project is expected to be completed towards the end of September 2023.



This project is proudly funded by the NSW Government under the Female Friendly Community Sport Facilities Program.

Council will also contribute additional funds to undertake refurbishment works to the male side of the facility along with the main entrance off Dalton Street, which will receive a new shopfront and auto doors.

7.2. Parkes Tennis Courts Resurfacing

Parkes Tennis Club continued their excellent work in maintaining the Parkes Tennis courts at Woodward Oval. The major project to resurface the courts was completed last financial year, however there was still outstanding warranty works at the time of this report. There were problems with the base on some of the courts, which has resulted in major delays in completing the project. Parkes Shire Council is continuing to work with a new contractor to complete the remediation work on those affected courts.

7.3. Parkes Golf Course Upgrade

Although the Parkes Golf Club is not a Council facility, Golf is an important sport, and the golf club and course are an important community asset. Parkes Shire Council designed and installed the irrigation system used at the club because it uses recycled water from the Sewer Treatment Plan to irrigate the fairways and greens.

The new Parkes bypass, which is currently under construction, runs directly adjacent to the western boundary of the Parkes Golf Club. There were significant safety concerns about golf balls potentially landing on the road, so the Parkes Golf Club board worked closely with Transport for NSW (TfNSW) to address this risk together and come up with a solution. Several different options were explored, including a large net structure, small modifications or a redesign of the golf course.

Due to the ongoing maintenance issues for both parties, the options of net structures were considered not feasible. The parties resolved to redesign the course so that all holes would hit away from the bypass. The biggest benefit of the new course is the fact it will now be a par 72, which will open doors for the Club to host future NSW championships.

The landscaping work has now almost been completed and the full course is expected to be available for use in September.

7.4. Cheney Park Rehabilitation and Drainage - Final Stage

Funding has been secured to enable the rehabilitation of the southern end of Cheney Park with the installation of further drainage works. Tenders were called; however, the responses exceeded the project budget, so it was put on hold until the Stephen Davies Field upgrade was completed.

7.5. Lake Endeavour – Places to Swim Project

Lake Endeavour is set to be transformed into the first developed natural water location for recreational use in the Shire thanks to \$ 1 million in funding from the NSW Government under the Open Spaces Places to Swim Program.

Through the NSW Government's program, Parkes Shire Council will deliver safety upgrades as well as the installation of new recreational infrastructure to encourage people to get active in, on and around Lake Endeavour - from swimming, kayaking and paddle boarding, to fishing, walking and relaxing by the water.

Parkes Shire Council is currently reviewing the infrastructure improvements to prevent unsafe movement near the dam overflow and provide easy access to the water.

All proposed project elements and future activation elements are to be universally designed, with ease of access at the forefront of considerations. Consideration to the environmental impact of all project elements throughout the entire planning process, with all development aspects planned to avoid vegetation clearance and preserve the existing habitat.

Natural features such as mature habitat trees have been incorporated into the design to provide shade and aesthetic appeal.

The Lake Endeavour activation will add to Parkes Shire's ecotourism offerings and further planning to develop ecotourism in our shire. All these combined elements will create an inviting space where everyone can relax and connect.

The project design is being finalised, with works on this project expected to be completed in mid-2024. Items under consideration for inclusion are a floating pontoon, floating barrier to the wall and spillway, sandy beach, amenities block and mobile phone reception improvements.



7.6. Kelly Reserve Splash Park

Parkes Shire is finally set to open a free water play space at Kelly Reserve in Parkes following the awarding of \$500,000 in funding from the NSW Government under the Open Spaces - Places to Play grant program.

Community consultation has identified Kelly Reserve as the most suitable location for a water play space. The new play space will enhance the Kelly Reserve precinct as a social hub and gathering space, providing an entertaining and engaging space for the community and visitors to Parkes.

The play space will be designed using the topography of the Lachlan catchment and the rivers, lakes, dams, weirs, and bores as inspiration. Interpretive signage will tell the story of water and explain the physics and engineering that surround natural and engineered water flow.

Innovation, inclusivity, and accessibility is at the forefront of this project ensuring that people of all ages and abilities can engage in play, with inclusions such as a splash pad, water fountains, wide bridges and trickling streams included.

Works on this project are expected to be completed mid-2024. This project has been co-funded by Northparkes Mines.

7.7. Tullamore Pool Upgrade

Parkes Shire Council has been successful in securing \$100,000 from the NSW Government through the Stronger Country Communities Fund (SCCF) to upgrade the Tullamore Pool. The upgrade works have started and include a new shell to provide a modern, easily cleaned facility.



The old structure had been maintained over the last 20 years with regular patching performed. Replacing the entire fibreglass shell will see reduced maintenance for repairs and ensure the longevity of the facilities into the future.

Parkes Shire Council will also contribute funds from the Tullamore Town Improvement fund, with works to be completed in time for the 2023-24 season opening.

7.8. Peak Hill Pool Upgrade

This project will see the public swimming pool in Peak Hill rejuvenated with new fibreglass and supporting concrete concourse, both of which are currently failing. The fibreglass is more than 20 years old and is now cracked and needing urgent repairs. The pool is an important place for the local community to connect and keep cool during the summer months.

The project is funded under the following funding streams:

- Stronger Country Communities Fund (round 5) \$160,000
- PSC Capital for Pools \$176,984.73
- Peak Hill CCC \$ 240,000
- LRCI Round 5 grant \$208,241

The project has commenced with contracts being awarded. The contractors have taken possession of the site and commenced blasting of the existing surface.
